

# What Is an Oncology Social Worker?



CancerCare employs 35+ masters' prepared oncology social workers with specialized training in oncology-related issues.

#### Who can receive counseling?

- Patients
- Caregivers
- Newly bereaved (in-person at our local offices)
- Children as young as five (in-person at our local offices)

#### **CancerCare Oncology Social workers can:**

- Provide cancer-focused support
- Help reduce feelings of anxiety and distress
- Help increase feelings of hope and empowerment
- Assist you in learning new ways of coping
- Help you improve communication with your medical team and loved ones
- Provide you with practical information about treatment
- Provide you with resources in your community

## Counseling



- Professional oncology social workers provide emotional, practical and financial support for anyone affected by cancer
- Available over the telephone or face-to-face
- Spanish-speaking social workers available

## Support Groups



- Offered for people with cancer, their loved ones and for people who have experienced the loss of a loved one
- Available online, over the phone and in person
- Led by professional oncology social workers who provide support and guidance
- Groups meet for approximately 3-4 months
- Members are assessed for groups






## Online Support Group Program



- 130+ online support groups offered each year for specific cancer diagnoses, caregivers and the bereaved
- Led by oncology social workers who provide guidance, resources and support
- Convenient and meaningful way to connect with others coping with similar issues
- Support for people unable to travel coping with side effects or caring for a loved one
- Password-protected (not an open message board format)



## Connect Education Workshops



- Leading experts in oncology provide up-to-date information in one-hour workshops conducted over the telephone or online
- Topics include cancer-specific treatment updates, coping with treatment side effects, caregiving and workplace issues
- In FY 2018, over 68,000 people listened to 68 Connect Education Workshops
- Past workshops available via toll-free number or cancercare.org/connect\_workshops





## Publications



#### **Connect Booklets and Fact Sheets**

- 300+ publications written by experts provide reliable, easy-to-read information on cancer-related topics
- Wide range of topics (e.g., cancer types, coping with cancer, caregiving, managing side effects and speaking with children)
- In FY 2018, more than 1.1 million print and digital publications were distributed—all free of charge

## Financial Assistance



#### CancerCare provides limited financial help for cancer-related costs, including:

- Transportation to/from treatment
- Home care
- Child care
- Co-payment assistance

#### For women or men with breast cancer, assistance also includes:

- Pain and anti-nausea medication
- Oral hormonal medication
- Lymphedema support
- Durable medical equipment


In FY 2018, \$41.1 million was distributed to over 25,499 people.

## Cancer Care Co-Payment Assistance Foundation (CCAF)



- Helps people afford insurance co-payments for chemotherapy and targeted treatment drugs
- Covered diagnoses have included: breast, colorectal, gastric, glioblastoma, head and neck, lung, pancreatic and renal cell
- For both privately insured and Medicare patients
- \$140 million has been distributed since its inception in 2007

- Free weekend overnight retreat at a dude ranch in Milford, PA for families who have experienced the loss of a loved one to cancer
- For the entire family—
  parents and children attend
- Fun recreational activities (swimming, fishing, horseback riding and games) are combined with therapeutic grief activities





## Magnolia Meals at Home



- Magnolia Meals at Home is a meal delivery program that provides a nutritious foundation for patients living with breast cancer, thyroid cancer, kidney cancer, or soft-tissue sarcoma, and their families.
- Meals are available in and around Woodcliff Lake, NJ, Andover, MA and Raleigh-Durham, NC (as well as in areas in New York, New Hampshire, and Boston, MA).


# Cancer Care Patient Access and Engagement Report (CAPER)



The 2016 Cancer Care Patient Access and Engagement Report illustrates the many physical, emotional, financial, practical and informational needs cancer patients experience during and after clinical treatment.

It reflects the perspectives of more than 3,000 patients diverse in ethnicity, income, education, geography, age, insurance, cancer type and treatment stage.

Cancer Care conducted this study to learn more about how patients experience life after a cancer diagnosis, in order to inform our program development and most accurately represent and address the needs of patients throughout their continuum of care and after clinical treatment is complete.




# Cancer Care Patient Access and Engagement Report (CAPER)



## Through fielding six national surveys, this report:

- Defines engagement specifically as it relates to cancer patients
- Identifies barriers to cancer patient engagement with care providers
- Characterizes the financial, emotional, social and quality-of-life costs of cancer to patients and families
- Recommends strategies and programs to promote cancer patient access and engagement

## Why the PAW Program Matters



The most vulnerable patients are often in the greatest need of support from their companion animals. However, these patients – without a strong support system, the elderly, low income or uninsured – are also at the greatest risk losing their pets.



## PAW Program Components



- Financial assistance
- Educational webcasts focused on caring for pets throughout the cancer journey
- Wide dissemination of print/digital materials
- Access to free services such as counseling services, information and referrals

## Disaster Response Program



- Provides financial assistance to cancer patients in active treatment who have been evacuated from their homes and/or otherwise prevented from accessing treatment
- Financial assistance can be used for medical bills, homecare, childcare, transportation, lodging and treatments
- Oncology providers can order appointment transportation and medication delivery for patients, with direct billing to CancerCare





## Cancer Care for Kids



- Children and teens affected by cancer have special needs and concerns that can be addressed by social workers who have specialized training
- Offers practical support, education and advice to parents and caregivers, and counseling to children and teens to help them better understand cancer
- Provides financial assistance to families to help with transportation, child care and other treatmentrelated costs
- Holds therapeutic recreational events and educational workshops that teach children and parents how to talk to each other about cancer



Services are free of charge and are available in both English and Spanish

## Young Adult Program



- Approximately 70,000 adolescents and young adults (age 15–39) are diagnosed with cancer each year in the U.S.
- Cancer incidence in adolescents and young adults has increased more than any other age group
- Psychosocial concerns include dating and relationships, fertility preservation, body image, sexuality, financial stress, workplace issues and long-term effects of treatment
- CancerCare's Young Adult Program: free professional support services, including young adult-specific counseling, support groups and publications

## Older Adult Program



- As cancer risk increases with age, the number of older adults seeking treatment is increasing dramatically with the aging population
- People are living longer with cancer and must cope with long-term effects of treatment
- Issues for older adults may include: managing side effects, anxiety, depression, multiple medical conditions, family concerns, financial stress and isolation
- CancerCare recognizes the unique needs of older adult patients and caregivers and the importance of providing support, information and resources



## Caregiver Program



- Caregiver-specific services include support groups, counseling, publications and Connect Education Workshops
- Help caregivers better understand their roles and identify strengths to best manage the difficulties of caring for a loved one with cancer
- Issues for caregivers include fatigue, relationship concerns, financial difficulties, isolation and lack of self-care
- My Cancer Circle is a free, private support community for caregivers of people facing cancer



"One of the challenges that I was facing as a caregiver was feeling the need to be 'on' all the time, feeling that I had to be the one who remained strong and healthy. The caregiver support group really gave me an outlet to talk to people who were going through the same thing that I was going through. I could be completely honest, and didn't have to put any sort of a façade on it." –Kathryn

## Women's Cancers Program



- Free counseling and support groups help women cope with anxiety and sadness, communicate with their family and medical team, balance treatment and other responsibilities (e.g., work, parenting) and make treatment decisions
- Groups are also available for young women,
   LGBT community and Spanish-speaking women



- CancerCare partners with Susan G. Komen and the Triple Negative Breast Cancer Foundation to provide specialized services
- Offers a wig and breast prosthesis clinic in NYC-area—women receive personalized fittings, free products to improve their confidence and sense of well-being, and psychosocial support from an oncology social worker.
   Wig clinics are offered in our regional offices.

## Bereavement Program



- Provide much-needed support for people who have experienced the loss of a loved one to cancer—spouses, children and family members
- Individual bereavement counseling at our offices
- Support groups—face-to-face and online bereavement support groups connect people with others
- Offer publications that provide guidance about coping with loss




